

Board Director Co-option

The RSGB Board has made this announcement:

Under the Article 32 a co-opted Director must retire at the AGM following their co-option. Ian Shepherd, G4EVK had been co-opted prior to the 2023 AGM and so would normally have had to retire from the Board. The Articles provide that "in exceptional circumstances, to fulfil a specific need, the Board may vary the above arrangements. Due notice will be published via RadCom."

Whilst the meaning of the Articles could be interpreted to make this requirement unnecessary the Board considers it prudent to put the point beyond doubt. It therefore gives notice that it has decided to co-opt Ian Shepherd under Article 37 to the Board to serve until the 2024 AGM without the need to stand for election or nomination. Its reasons are to ensure that the Board has sufficient members so as to address the challenges caused by the post pandemic changes in amateur radio, and society in general, and the significant economic challenges facing the United Kingdom.

ETCC volunteer required

Volunteers

The function of the ETCC is to assist radio amateurs seeking a Notice of Variation (NoV) to operate Repeaters, Gateways or Beacons within the United Kingdom.

The responsibilities of the volunteer will include assessment of the technical viability of applications and frequency assignments, to comply with Ofcom interference guidelines for maximising efficient use of the radio spectrum.

The objective of this work is to help the applicant to complete an NoV submission which will be acceptable to Ofcom at its first presentation.

The successful applicant for the ETCC position will have a broad experience of radio system engineering, analogue and digital modes, local topography, propagation theory and a helpful disposition towards applicants.

Proven experience in land mobile and associated fields, with a practical understanding of difficulties with co-located transmitters and receivers, would be a considerable advantage.

Coronation celebration: following last month's reminder to be selective with your outgoing cards, Jim, G3ZQQ Special Prefix Collection Manager contacted us. He is dismayed that after much work he is still waiting for many operators to send him collection envelopes for the Jubilee and can't store uncollected cards for much longer.



If you took advantage of the special 'R' prefix for the recent Coronation, now is the time to send some C5 collection envelopes, before you forget!

QSL cards for special occasions are never diverted for a number of reasons and must be collected separately to your usual callsign.

On the general subject of callsigns, those with more than one UK call should not seek to divert from one call to another and must always collect from the callsign used.

Diversion is intended only for use when operating from another geographical prefix in the UK or, where a UK member callsign holder has an overseas callsign and wishes to divert back to the home call.

Club calls, GB and short contest calls are not diverted, regardless of any 'via' on the card or shown at QRZ.com

Stamps again! Last month we told you that, from more than one source, we had been made aware of potentially counterfeit new-style, bar-coded stamps – a topic on which we've had a number of enquiries.

Tim, MOURX who knows a thing or two about the inner workings of the postal service, has kindly provided feedback on this topic. Here are extracts from what Tim sent us that will hopefully clarify things for members: "Royal Mail introduced barcode stamps to fight against the stamp re-sellers. For example, on eBay you can see tens of thousands of pounds worth of used or re-gummed stamps. Once the barcode goes through a Royal Mail sorting machine that barcode cannot be re-used. Bar codes on each stamp should be unique. If the bar code is identical then one or both would be fake. Once a stamp has gone through the postal system and then someone attempts to re-use it that is classified as counterfeit under revenue protection."

Thanks for your explanation Tim, and of course the moral is to always buy your stamps from the Post Office. If it looks a good deal elsewhere then it probably isn't.

RSGB National Radio Centre at Bletchley Park

Over the Coronation weekend, the RSGB's National Radio Centre at Bletchley Park (NRC) ran a special event station, callsign GB2DAY, to celebrate the Coronation of HM King Charles III. Running SSB on the 40m band, to give maximum opportunity for everyone to make a contact, over 500 stations were worked. Throughout, there was a continuous pile-up of stations calling-in from around the UK, and from France, Belgium, Netherlands and Germany, all looking to make a QSO. Steve, G1YBD along with Ken, G7FTD, and Chris, G7BED worked hard to take the QSOs, manage the logging, explain to visitors what was happening, and in many cases enabling visitors to pass greetings messages, all celebrating the Kings Coronation. With nearly 900 visitors coming into the NRC over the long weekend, it was indeed a busy but thoroughly enjoyable time, made even more spectacular by the Lancaster bomber flypast on Sunday. The NRC Coordinator Martyn, GOGMB, expressed his thanks to the twenty-three volunteers who came in over the two consecutive bank holiday weekends, all helping keep the NRC open and demonstrating amateur radio to the visitors.

Distance learning for Full licence exam

Since 2011, the Bath Based Distance Learning team (BBDL) has helped nearly one thousand students to obtain their Full licence. Student feedback is always very positive and the pass rate continues to be well over 80%, compared with a national average of around 66%.

The BBDL team is now planning another Full licence level course. The course will run from the end of August to December, with exams in January.

Students receive weekly work packages via an online classroom and have access to weekly online tutorials. Each student is allocated to one of the remote tutors who provide feedback and additional guidance. There are weekly quizzes to check on progress and at the end of the course there are a number of mock exams.

There is no charge for the training but applicants must work through some pre-course material and complete a quiz to be eligible for a place. This focuses on the 'new' Intermediate topics that were introduced to the syllabus in 2019. The aims of the pre-course classroom are to make sure applicants can use the BBDL systems, and to ensure that they are ready for the current Full training syllabus.

Each student will need to provide their own RSGB Full licence textbook and arrange their own exam at the end of the course. Advice will be provided as part of the course.

2023 IARU HF World Championship Contest



The 2023 IARU HF World Championship Contest will begin at 1200UTC on Saturday 8 July and end at 1200UTC on Sunday 9 July. Both single- and multi-operator stations may operate during the entire 24-hour period.

All licensed amateurs worldwide are eligible to participate in this contest. The objective is to contact as many other amateurs as possible, especially IARU member society HQ stations, around the world using the 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10m bands. Multipliers are the total number of ITU zones plus IARU member society HQ stations worked on each band (not mode). Thus, your Society's HQ stations participation is very important for the multipliers.

IARU officials represent a maximum of four multipliers per band (AC, R1, R2 and R3). Our two regional AC members have the option of using "AC" or our regional designator "R3". Regional EC members who are not AC members must use our designator "R3". You can find the complete rules at http://www.arrl.org/iaru-hf-world-championship

Guernsey 2023 NatWest International Island Games



Once every two years, thousands of athletes from across the globe come together to compete in the NatWest International Island Games.

In 1985, as part of their Year of Sport, the Isle of Man set in motion an ambitious plan to bring together athletes from small islands across the world to take part in a new sporting festival dubbed the 'Inter-Island Games'.

700 sportsmen and women from 15 islands landed on Manx soil for what the UK national press called the 'Small Islands Mini Olympics'. Competitors hailed from the Faroe Islands and Scandinavia in the northern hemisphere, the British Isles, the Mediterranean and as far afield as St Helena in the South Atlantic – a 5,000-mile trip.

In 1998 the Games secured sponsorship with NatWest International, which now provides financial assistance to host islands to ease the significant cost of hosting such a large-scale event.

After a week of events in eight different sports, the festival was deemed such a success it was agreed to continue it every other year, with the second Games to be held in Guernsey in 1987.

From 8 to 14 July 2023, Guernsey will once again host the Island Games, and members of Guernsey Amateur Radio Society will be running special event callsign GB5IG.

This will be the 19th Island Games and will include 14 different sports.

The callsign will be active from Friday 7 to Saturday 15 July on the 80 to 10m bands using SSB, FT8/FT4 and some satellite work, including QO-100. There may be some CW activity too.

QSL will be via Logbook of the World, or direct only to GU8ITE.

The islands involved this year are Aaland (OHO, EU002), Alderney (EU114), Bermuda (NA005), Cayman Islands (NA016), Falkland Islands (SA002), Faroe Islands (EU018), Froya (LA, EU036), Gibraltar, Gotland (SM, EU020), Gozo (EU023), Greenland (NA018), Guernsey (EU114), Hitra (LA, EU036), Isle of Man (EU116), Isle of Wight (EU005), Jersey EU013), Menorca (EU004), Orkney (EU009), Sareemaa (ES, EU034), St Helena (AF022), Sark (EU114), Shetland Islands (EU012), Western Isles (EU010), and Ynys Mon (Anglesey, EU005).

All amateurs are invited to make contact, especially those from the 24 competing islands. See https://guernsey2023.gg for more information about what is happening in Guernsey.

Charles "Chip" Margelli, K7JA, Silent Key

One of the best-known amateurs of the past 40 years has become a Silent Key. Charles "Chip" Margelli, K7JA, was sadly lost on 25 May.

News was received from his close friend Gordon West, WB6NOA: "Chip left us yesterday at 4pm, after spending weeks putting together Field Day station antennas and gear. That is



all he would talk about – a great station on the air! He passed away peacefully, with dignity, at his home, with Janet and his cat at his side. He gracefully closed his eyes, with piles of Field Day equipment and cables he prepared, ready for deployment, right next to his chair."

Chip never complained, never let on to his fight, and always had a smile for the upcoming Field Day event. So professional. He was always totally positive in all that he could do for ham radio operators. What a gentleman – a true fighter to the end. We are all heartbroken."

Chip was a ham's ham, a contester (and frequent winner), DXer, DXpeditioner (he was part of the ZA1A team that reintroduced ham radio to Albania in 1991 and a member of the 2003 COOUS joint US/ Cuban Field Day operation), moonbouncer, weak-signal VHFer, satellite operator and more. Chip spent three decades as the 'face' of Yaesu in the United States, attending hamfests, visiting dealers and introducing new gear. After leaving Yaesu, Chip worked for Heil Sound and as CQ Advertising Manager before leaving the hamfest circuit and working behind the scenes at Ham Radio Outlet. He couldn't totally stay home, though, as he continued to be in high demand as a banquet speaker at conventions and hamfests.

Chip is perhaps best known among the general ham public for his 2005 appearance on "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno," in which he and partner Ken Miller, K6CTW proved they could send a message faster in Morse code than by texting. Chip was inducted into the CQ Amateur Radio Hall of Fame in 2008 and awarded Russia's E.T. Krenkel medal in 2021.

Rockall Expedition

The amateur radio part of the Rockall 2023 expedition is over, but team leader Cam Cameron plans to stay on the island until 18 July in an attempt to break the record for the longest occupation of the island and to raise money for charity.

During 54 hours on the air, MMOUKI was operated almost continuously by Nobby Styles, GOVJG and Emil Bergmann, DL8JJ, making a total of 7,227 QSOs. They were perched on a ledge near the top of the 56ft (17m) high rock – the only (approximately) level site which also housed their accommodation pod.

Bandpass filters enabled both operators to be QRV at the same time, each running 100W from Yaesu FT-857 radios and wire antennas supported on fibreglass poles sticking out from the rock. Cam, Nobby and Emil are three of only six people ever to spend time overnight on Rockall, which is in the north Atlantic 230 miles west of the Outer Hebrides.
