

Reward your sub manager

The best way to reward your sub manager is to collect your cards, even if you never send any, you may be in for a pleasant surprise. All it takes is a C5 envelope and a stamp.

Note: for those new to the bureau, or even if you are an experienced amateur, please remember to put your callsign in the top left, with your Membership number immediately underneath when sending SAEs to your sub manager (not us!). See website for details.

Important reminder

A reminder from last month concerning diversions and summer holidays: diversion is intended only for use when operating from another geographical prefix in the UK or, where a UK Member holds a personal overseas callsign and wishes to divert back to the UK.

Club calls, GB, Contest calls, special prefix (Coronation etc) and three-tier licences are not diverted, regardless of any postings on the card or at QRZ.com

Holders of multiple calls should not divert from one call to another. It's easy to remember: always collect from the callsign used during the QSO.

his first batch of uncollected cards weighing in at around 18kgs (approximately 5,800 cards). He followed up by reminding us of the maxim we told him when he first became a volunteer: don't think of those who don't collect their cards - they're missing out; instead think of those who value what we do.

It takes time

At the central bureau we sort incoming cards into groups and prefixes but it's down to our army of volunteers to track the cards to individual Members. The process involves a number of alphabet sorts and re-sorts, working from the first to the third letter of the callsign. The larger the group, the more time it takes.

Then, of course, there's the question of finding the right envelopes, checking not only the number, weight and thickness of the package against the stamps provided, but finally a trip to the post office or box.


Board Director change

RSGB National Radio Centre at Bletchley Park

Armed Forces Day and also International Museums on the Air was celebrated at the NRC on 24 June. Whilst GB3RS was promoting the Bletchley Park Museum (station number 5491) on 20m SSB, the special event GB1SOE station was operating at the NRC front entrance, running CW on 40m, making contact with stations commemorating the work of Special Operations Executive (SOE) wireless operatives throughout Europe. In use on 40m was a Whaddon MKIII (Tinkerbox) TX and an HRO RX. Additionally, an AR88 RX in the NRC foyer was used to monitor the transmissions. Thanks go to John, G4JGG; Peter, MOPJD and Trevor, G4WKJ for putting on the SOE station.

Volunteers were delighted to welcome Air Cadets from the 295 (Witham and Rivenhall) Squadron to the NRC for a private evening visit in late May. Accompanied by their Squadron Commander and the Radio Communications Instructor, the cadets, many of whom already have, or are studying for, their radio communication qualifications, were delighted to further their understanding of radio communications from an amateur radio, rather than military, perspective. Time was taken to discuss the implication of varying propagation conditions and demonstrate communication on several amateur bands, including satellite communication. All cadets passed greetings messages when the GB3RS station was fired-up on the 40m band with SSB stations calling in from around the UK. In June, NRC volunteers were delighted to welcome students from **Notting Hill & Ealing High School**. Three groups of ten students, all studying Physics and Computer Science, each spent 40 minutes in the NRC talking about the electromagnetic spectrum, conventional short-wave radio communication, propagation and uses of the radio spectrum, before then moving on to satellite communications, with demonstrations of both polar orbiting and geostationary satellite systems at the NRC. A number of QSOs were made on both the 40m band and the QO-100 station enabling many of the students to pass greetings messages. NRC Volunteers welcomed members of **Milton Keynes ARS** for a private evening visit on a very hot and humid mid-June summer's evening. Initially club members were given a brief overview of the NRC, how visitors to the Bletchley Park museum are welcomed, explaining about the role of the Military Y Stations, the RSS and VIs, all intercepting and providing Bletchley Park with messages for decrypting in WWII. With several news displays installed since their visit last year, there was plenty to look at. Needless to say, the main attraction was to get some hands-on time with the GB3RS station with several QSOs being made on HF, QO-100 and Polar Orbiting satellites. The latest new display is the wide-band amateur TV being received via the QO-100 geostationary satellite. Despite the excessive heat, it was a successful and thoroughly enjoyable evening.

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Ofcom consultation on making amateur radio licences fit for the future

On 23 June 2023 Ofcom proposed changes to amateur radio licences and policies to make sure the authorisation regime meets the needs of current and future amateur radio users. Ofcom say its changes are designed to provide radio amateurs with greater operating freedoms to reflect how the hobby has evolved. Ofcom is proposing to update the amateur radio licence to enable amateur radio to continue to develop, within a simplified regulated framework that supports optimal spectrum use. This is part of a broader effort by Ofcom to streamline, standardise and, where possible, further automate elements of its licensing work.

Ofcom is proposing to keep the existing three-tier licensing structure but is proposing a number of other changes. These include: allowing non-licensees to use radio equipment provided they are supervised by a licensee; licensees to hold only one personal licence; a number of changes relating to callsigns; increase the maximum permitted power in some bands by allowing Foundation licensees to transmit with 20W, Intermediate with 100W and Full 1000W; removing the need to obtain some NoVs; liberalising elements of the Foundation licence; allowing some low-power airborne use and simplifying the current licence conditions.

Ofcom is asking for comments on the proposals by 4 September 2023, using the response form provided on its website. Following responses, Ofcom plans to publish its decision by the end of 2023. Ofcom has said that if it was to implement these changes it would be done in three phases of work planned over the next couple of years.

The following summary of the proposed changes appears on pages 3 and 4 of Ofcom's consultation:

What we [Ofcom] are proposing - in brief

We are proposing changes to our amateur radio licences and guidelines to ensure they meet the needs of today and tomorrow's radio amateurs and streamline the licensing processes. Our proposed changes would:

1. Update the overall licensing framework:

- Maintain the existing 3-tier licensing framework while streamlining Notices of Variation (NoV);
- Maintain lifetime licences while updating our mechanisms for revalidation;
- Allow anyone to operate amateur radio equipment under a licensee's supervision;
- Only permit licensees to hold a single individual licence, requiring surrender of lower licences as they progress.

2. Streamline and modernise call sign assignment:

• Update our call sign allocation policy in a number of areas including (i) changes to the rules on the reissuing of call signs; (ii) changes to the number of call signs that can be held; (iii) enabling licensees to change their call sign; (iv) expanding the use of suffixes; (v) introducing a new M8 and M9 Intermediate call sign format; (vi) making Regional Secondary Locators (RSLs) optional and simplifying the process for using a special RSL; and (vii) simplifying rules around Special Event Stations.

3. Adjust technical parameters to reflect the evolving needs of the hobby and provide radio amateurs with greater operating freedom:

- Increase the maximum permitted transmit power to allow (i) 20 Watts for Foundation and 100 Watts for Intermediate licensees in most bands; and (ii) 1000 Watts for Full licensees in bands where amateur radio has a primary allocation;
- Allow Foundation and Intermediate licensees to use the internet for remote control operation;
- Permit the deployment of repeaters, beacons and gateways without requiring a NoV in most cases;
- · Allow Foundation licensees to build their own equipment and access the 2.4 GHz and 5 GHz bands; and
- Enable low power airborne use in some frequency bands.

4. Provide clearer updated rules (terms and conditions which are easy for everyone to understand):

- Align various terms and conditions with other licences that Ofcom issues;
- Simplify conditions to remove unnecessary complexity and make them clearer; and
- Remove provisions not needed for spectrum management purposes.

We welcome responses to our proposals by 5pm on 4 September 2023. Following responses, we will publish a statement setting out our changes to the amateur radio licence.

The overview section in this document is a simplified high-level summary only. The proposals we are consulting on and our reasoning are set out in the full document.

International Lighthouse Lightship Weekend (ILLW)



NARSA Contest Muster 2023 Q DX Marathon

CQ Magazine's Annual DX Marathon event runs until the end of December. Simply work as many countries and CQ Zones as you can, regardless of the band or mode. Each country and zone counts only once, so you can concentrate on working new ones, rather than working the same ones on multiple bands and modes.

Free software is provided and the goal is to obtain as many points for the category the station enters at antenna and power levels, as the rules state.

After adding your log to the excel software it calculates your current points. This gets submitted (one category only so individual stations do not dominate) and checked for accuracy. First, second and third placings are awarded and plaques given to those who achieve the highest score in their category.

The annual CW Open Contest is taking place next month.

Three sessions will be held on 2 September: 0000 to 0359UTC, 1200 to 1559UTC and 2000 to 2359UTC.

Now is an excellent time to start to organise your team and get it registered. Last year there were 25 registered teams with members

from all three ITU regions. You do not need to be a CWops member to be on a team. Team membership has no geographic restrictions. It can be local, national or

international.

If you have not yet participated in the CW Open, you should give it a try! Each session is a standalone event and is only four hours long. With that flexibility you can operate as little or as much as you want. You can even win an award by participating in only one session. Unlike the weekly CWTs, the CW Open is more of a contest and less of a sprint. Plaques and Trophies are awarded for all power classes.

British inland Waterways on the Air (BiWota), 26 to 28 August

The event is open to all amateurs who are boaters, cyclists or walkers and

who use canals, rivers, towpaths and riverbanks for work or recreation. Even lakes and reservoirs that are used for recreation classify as inland waterways. So there are many places available for activation. Many clubs and individual amateurs on or near the UK inland waterways obtain special



event station (SES) callsigns. Others operate mobile or portable using their own callsigns. Many more like to contact the BiWota stations. The event is also a good chance for Worked All Britain (WAB) enthusiasts to get some rare WAB squares.

The primary bands of operation will be 40m and 2m, but all bands will be acceptable.

The aim of the event is to bring together radio amateurs who regularly use the waterways to celebrate their hobby and raise awareness of the UK waterways.

In May, Members of Furness ARS had a great evening operating GB23BIR from Birkrigg common, South Cumbria. GB23BIR is part of the RSGB Beaconnect project. After 90 minutes of operating, 65 QSOS were in the log, and a great evening was had by all. It is hoped that GB23BIR will be activated again before the end of June.

In late May, the Society held its first 2m fox hunt event of the year. Mike, MOMJX was the fox (following his winning of the event last year); Martyn, MOTEB and Dave, G7MCE acted as one team; Nick, G0HIK with Chris, MOKPW were another team; Mark, MONOM (on a motorbike), Les, 2E0LBI and Chris, MOTES went solo.

By 7pm, Mike was in position. After an hour of transmitting, for two minutes every five minutes, clues to the location were given which became more specific as time went on. Eventually the first team of Martyn and Dave arrived at 8.20pm, followed shortly after by Mark on his motorbike. Chris and Nick were third.

Also in May, Chris, MOKPW registered GB23BAI as part of the RSGB's Beaconnect Project. There is the site of an old beacon in his home village of Askam in Furness. On the



evening of 18 May, Chris activated GB23BAI beacon site for around 90 minutes. Chris hadn't expected to be able to get too close to the beacon site as it is on private land. At the time of reporting, **Fort Purbrook ARC** members are looking forward to their first Digital Modes Field Weekend scheduled for 23 to 25 June. Sadly, both previously-programmed Field Weekends at the Fort had to be cancelled at short notice. Nevertheless, May managed to end on a high through a well-received Smith Chart teach-in, tutored by Gary, G3TMG on 26 May together with continued positive feedback from FPARC's series of monthly 'open to all' practical evenings at the Deverell Hall, Purbrook.

The early June heat wave, and site availability, saw the deployment of a quick-reaction field event on the lower ramparts on 3 and 4 June. The objective, an 'Experimenter's Weekend' was designed to encourage attendees to bring their own equipment and receive help and advice as necessary.

Surprisingly, the highlight of the weekend surfaced from the depths of 23cm. Chris, G3WIE had fielded his 23cm line-up, an FT-817 with retro-fitted spectrum display, 23cm/ 2m transverter, masthead PA/preamp feeding a dual 36-element Yagi. Upon switch-on, the receiver was swamped with QRN. Dummy load testing ruled out the equipment chain as the source and confirmed antenna pick-up. Several suspects were identified. Deploying the beam at 90° of elevation reduced the noise but, more significantly, directing the beam to earth increased the noise level considerably. This quickly stimulated a 'fox hunt' through a number of subterranean

rooms in the Fort where various electrical and telecom items were switched off to no effect. One potential noise source that could not be isolated, the Fort Fire Alarm System remains the prime suspect. Until the source is confirmed and eliminated, 23cm band working from the Fort has been ruled out.

The FPARC practical evening on 9 June concentrated on the 2m Yagi aka 'The Plunger', specifically the tricky bit of constructing the feedline trap, pictured here, carefully making and trimming down the coaxial capacitor with the aid of a NanoVNA.



The Isle of Wight RS took part in its first contest as a club station and wants to thank all its members who participated and looks forward to doing more in the future. The Morse group is now often to be found on a Friday night using the G3SKY callsign so listen out for a variety of speeds and call in for a QSO with the club.

I am sure it is because it is secretive and only understood by a very few people. The job now is how to use this to get them interested in amateur radio. The Society will be working on the solution to that before its next demonstration at 'Operation Market Harborough' in August

A good day was had by all and it was a successful demonstration of amateur radio. The Society will work on perfecting it for its next outing and see how it can expand on the CW section – perhaps getting people to send their names using a key and oscillator then awarding them a WVARS Morse Certificate.
