

The new amateur radio licence has now been in effect for a few weeks. Changes to the licence conditions have made it necessary to revise the examination syllabus. We are pleased to release v1.6 of the syllabus which includes these revisions.

Compared to v1.5 in current use, the only section that has seen major changes is Section 1- "Licensing and station identification". In Section 7 – "Operating practices and procedures" – there were some minor changes, for example regarding suffixes.

We will begin examining to v1.6 of the syllabus on 1 September 2024.

President's Review of 2023

ARISS contact at Acorn Multi Academy Trust

On 17 April 2024, ARISS International facilitated a successful contact between the International Space Station (ISS) and students from Acorn Multi Academy Trust, near the Dorset/Devon border. Matthew Dominick, KCOTOR, who operated as NA1SS, was the astronaut who answered the children's questions. Axminster Community Primary Academy hosted the contact and operated as GB4ACA.

The atmosphere in the room was palpable as nearly 200 students, teachers and support crew waited for the ISS to answer the first QSO. Ciaran Morgan, MOXTD is the ARISS Operations Lead for the UK as well as the RSGB ARISS Coordinator, and he operated the radio whilst 15 students asked questions. It was a moment that the students (and adults) will never forget and truly put the spotlight on amateur radio.

ARISS enables contacts between astronauts and schools around the world – read more about its 40th anniversary celebrations on page 70 of this issue.



Cards from Vietnam are not something we see every day. Our experience is that they are somewhat rare. Our first thought when we saw this card in a packet from Thailand was perhaps it was a visitor to 3W. Actually, it's the card of US-born Bruce who's been a resident there with his family since 2007. The reverse of his card carries an amazing list of his other calls. He has certainly travelled over the years!

The QRZ.com entry lists Logbook of the World for confirmation or requests a \$3 payment to his friend Champ, E21EIC in Thailand to cover the postage etc. Some might moan at paying to receive a QSL card, however, if you live or visit a desirable radio location, think of the volume of requests and the cost of providing everyone with a card for free.

Here at the Bureau, we all too often see cards intended for rare locations that we know are not going to get a reply or we cannot deliver.

G1-G2 and G3G-L

Last month we told you that sub-manager Lindsay, G8PMA was moving house and we would be holding back these two groups until he advised that he was settled.

This month we're pleased to report that Lindsay is now resident in Downpatrick, Northern Ireland. He has received his cards and has a newto-him callsign. Lindsay can now be heard on the air as GI3KME. His email address is unchanged. Lindsay has taken all envelopes and current (90 days or less) uncollected cards for which he has no envelopes at his new address. C5 collection envelopes can now be sent to the address listed on the RSGB website.

Heavy users

Recently, we received a consignment of cards from a European country, half of which were from a single club station, celebrating an anniversary. This prompted us to remind our members that more than 1kg of cards for a single country destination should not be

sent via the RSGB Bureau. This rule exists not

simply due to cost but also in the interest of fairness to other members. The size/volume of a single carton that we can send overseas is limited by our contract. Filling the box with one member's cards serves to delay others cards and is deemed unfair.

Times change

There was a time when almost everyone collected their cards worldwide. This is no longer the case and QSLing 100% outgoing is not advisable. For a number of years, we have been advising to 'check before you send every time'. It's never been easier to check online.

This advice includes checking the IARU QSL Bureau list online to find out if there is a destination bureau in operation. It's now very common for operators to be viewing the other station's details online during the contact. This is a good time to check the QSL information and make a note. At QRZ.com it should appear on the top left below the callsign and address details. If not, why not ask before wasting a card or not receiving a reply? Richard J Constantine, G3UGF

The UK Six Metre Group (UKSMG) Summer Marathon



The UKSMG aims to promote and encourage activity on the 6m band and the Summer Marathon is an ideal opportunity to raise activity. The UKSMG Summer Marathon is open to all amateur radio operators worldwide (UKSMG membership is not required). The Group would like to thank Hannu, OH3WW/OH1HS for his outstanding work prior to 2014 in developing this contest into a

successful annual event.

The objective is to work as many four-digit grid squares as possible between the first Saturday of May (4 May 2024 at 0000UTC) and

the first Sunday of August (4 August 2024 ending at 2359UTC) on the 6m band.

The Marathon is now split into two sections: Legacy Modes and Digital Modes.

Any QSO may be uploaded. The UKSMG website will then sort the 'Legacy' modes from the 'Digital' modes and present them in separate standings tables. You may enter either or both sections.

Logs can be submitted until 18 August 2024.



To make a contribution to this very important time in WWII, **Newbury And District ARS (NADARS)** will be using a very special callsign at its permanent HF radio station at the control tower.

Earlier this year, Phill Morris, G6EES submitted a detailed proposal to Ofcom requesting that the Society be issued with a unique callsign, GB80DDAY (80th D-Day). This is unique because GB special event callsigns usually contain only a single number and two or three letters. After requests for more information from Ofcom, the NoV was granted.

You are invited to take part, on-air, in the 80th anniversary of D-Day and make contact with GB80DDAY. The callsign will be active from 1 to 28 June. In addition to operating the HF station remotely from home during the weekdays and evenings, operators will be active at the control tower each Saturday morning in June. Operators will also have a special focus on operation at the control tower on Thursday 6 June (D-Day) when there will be a number of other activities, organised by both the tower's team of volunteers and other organisations.

Between the two of them, Dave and Howard managed to test and analyse everything and members went away with all their queries answered.

REGION 12: EAST & EAST ANGLIA

Thames ARG's secretary was recently contacted by somebody with a tantalising offer of radio-related materials. She had found TARG through its popular website (thamesarg.org.uk). She had over 300 QSL cards and some certificates and photos, the pride and joy of a long-silent key some of whose family had once lived at her QTH – Robert Jardine, G6QX, who was first licensed in 1928 (a picture of Robert's shack is included here). She had already approached the NRC at Bletchley Park, but its capacity was limited and couldn't take the collection. We were asked if we would take the collection. So off we went!

The treasure trove we collected is a remarkable record of a skilled, enthusiastic amateur who, in the 1930s, 40s and 50s reached both across the world via CW, and to amateurs closer to home by voice. The 325 QSL cards (a small selection is pictured here) are a remarkable record of contacts across political, geographical and intercontinental boundaries. He reached out to amateurs he never met, in country after country. TARG has his original licence certificate, and several issued to him by amateur radio bodies in the USA and beyond. There are black-and-white photos of Robert in his shack at home, where he clearly had equipment that, for its time, was state of the art. He was known across the UK including featuring in *RadCom*'s predecessor magazine on short-wave operation, and to the amateur community across so much of the world – including behind the Iron Curtain, in the then-British Empire, and overseas military bases, amateurs from the UK and other nations' services communities. We also hold poignant messages from German operators from 1939, expressing the hope for a brighter future for international contacts and friendships once the conflict was over and peace was restored.

M7LCF, a historian by training, has reviewed all that TARG holds and found it fascinating, and a clear indicator that long before mobile phones and the internet, SDR, D-Star, Freestar and many more platforms, radio was reaching across the globe, connecting people who may never meet, who shared the passion so many still have for this great hobby.

TARG members find it deeply impressive and poignant that, in Essex, with its rich history in radio through Marconi and other pioneers and champions, somebody living in a quiet suburb reached so many points on the map, drawing warm greetings from other amateurs – some close by, others at a distance, some of them thousands of miles away.

The 21st century TARG still reaches out far and wide, as it knows clubs and individual amateurs across the country also do.

As an example, on 15 April this year members joined a neighbouring Essex (Region 12) sister club Thurrock Acorns on its 10th anniversary open day at the Essex Wildlife Trust's wonderful Thameside reserve on the banks of the Themes Estuary. Two TARG members were based with Acorns, whilst three operated from TARG's 'out-station' at Two Tree Island near Southend. Together, members reached out across the world – digitally, and almost a century after G6QX did the same from his home shack nearby.

RAF Waddington ARC was delighted to support the International Bomber Command Centre's British Science Week pop-up event on 16 March 2024 with displays and activities centred around aircraft communication and tracking.
