

Look at the new practical events section on our website

The RSGB is keen to promote practical events for radio amateurs as a way of developing their skills and retaining their interest in amateur radio. The Society has also demonstrated that buildathons are a great way of engaging new audiences, giving people a taste of amateur radio in a fun and supportive environment. As part of its strategy, the RSGB held two workshops at the 2024 Convention to introduce individuals to radio-related usage of Micro Controller Units, or MCUs as they are often known. The Society also holds annual build-a-radio



events at Bletchley Park for youngsters, with the kits provided by the Radio Communications Foundation.

To support radio amateurs to try practical skills themselves or to put on their own events, the RSGB has published a new section on its website that is dedicated to practical events. You'll find a guide to running a buildathon, detailed information from the MCU workshop as well as a short video to inspire you!

Feedback from the RSGB's events have been wholly positive with requests for similar activities around the country. Could your club host an event and perhaps even boost its numbers at the same time? Find out more at rsgb.org/practical-events

RSGB volunteer confirmed as Chair of CEPT Frequency Management Working Group

At its recent meeting, the CEPT Frequency Management Working Group (WG-FM) confirmed that RSGB Microwave Manager Barry Lewis, G4SJH (in his IARU role) would continue as Chair for a further three-year period, having first been appointed in 2019.

The meeting also noted updates to T/R 61-01 for Georgia joining the scheme, as well as editorial changes to accommodate Australian licence changes and Canadian provincial prefixes.

Barry has also continued his work in CEPT on the 23cm band, following the outcomes from WRC-23.

IARU and RSGB volunteers are also starting ITU WRC-27 preparations, where further bands and topics of concern to amateur radio will be decided in 2027.

New focus on future spectrum

The RSGB strategic priority on spectrum has taken its next steps as the Society is now formally engaged on work for the 2027 and 2031 ITU World Radiocommunication Conferences. CEPT and ITU have already held their first preparation meetings for these events, where agenda items from HF to millimetre waves are key items of concern to amateur radio.



The RSGB has introduced a new special focus page on WRC-27/31 which you can find via rsgb.org/wrc-27 This page includes topics such as 6G telecoms and satellites, wireless power, space weather, and lunar communications.

Supporting a new WRC-31 opportunity, we are also grateful to Chris Whitmarsh, GOFDZ and Roger Ray, G8CUB for a great overview on amateur innovation above 275GHz, which you can read online at rsgb.org/terahertz

In parallel, work is also ongoing associated with the prior WRC-23 outcome and current CEPT considerations of the 1.3GHz (23cm) band.

The RSGB Awards Manager has added categories to the IARU Region 1 Award

The RSGB Awards Manager has announced that, with the support of the Board, he has added new categories of achievement to the IARU Region 1 Award. These include WARC bands only, 10MHz only, 18MHz only and 24MHz only.

The standard IARU Region 1 Award check spreadsheet should continue to be used for these categories. However, award chasers are advised to keep separate versions for each band or set of bands. There are no mode or power restrictions and there is no distinction between fixed and portable stations; you just have to be operating within the same country for all QSOs used in the application. There aren't any limitations on the start dates for the awards other than the dates for particular countries as identified in the check sheet. This reflects, for example, when a country became a member of the IARU.

The RSGB would like to thank the award chasers who contributed to the discussions about adding new categories.

RSGB elections – ensuring the right volunteers are in the right roles When this edition of RadCom lands on your mat we will be the middle of December, and I will have just four months of



When this edition of RadCom lands on your mat we will be the middle of December, and I will have just four months of my Presidency left. When I took up the role in April 2023, one of my main objectives was to steer the RSGB back onto a strategic course which would keep it strong and relevant into the future. At the strategic growth workshop in February, we identified the importance of having the right volunteers in the right roles. This is an opportunity to start putting that goal into action.

The RSGB needs new Board Directors and they will be required to have a variety of skills to fill the vacant positions. In my own case, I am one of the few at Board level with extensive experience in Spectrum matters and negotiating with the authorities, so that gap will need to be filled.

Outreach has been a very large part of our work over the past year, driven very ably by one Director, and this essential work must be supported and expanded. We have started to contact organisations such as u3a who have people interested in amateur radio, and there are many other like-minded organisations that we need to reach out to. This will require someone with drive and determination to develop the links, but in doing so they will also need tact and diplomacy.

This is your opportunity to be part of this vital work to keep us on track to deliver what we promised: growth of the hobby and RSGB membership, continued defence of our precious spectrum, together with a financially resilient Society. Please do have a look on the RSGB Board web page where you will see the range of areas that each Board Director oversees and the extensive menu to the right will give you an insight into the entire organisation: rsgb.org/board

About being the RSGB President

There is no job description or person specification for the role of President. Each President shapes the role and activities they carry out to best match their view of the role, and by responding to requests for activities which will arise during their term as President. But there are some traits and skills which are important.

Presentational and media skills: The President will represent the Society and amateur radio at events as they arise during the term, so candidates should have some experience of public speaking and delivering presentations to audiences of varying sizes. The President will also be expected to speak and appear on live media at amateur radio events and to the mainstream media as opportunities to promote the hobby arise.

Knowledge of amateur radio: The President will need to have at least a limited knowledge of most aspects of the hobby so they can meet and relate to, for example, special interest groups. The President will need to advocate for amateur radio and so should understand and be able to articulate clearly what makes our hobby great.

Knowledge of the RSGB: The Society is a broad organisation and so the President needs to understand how the Society works and how the various interest groups mesh with it and amateur radio. They also need good knowledge of the services the Society provides for its members and for the wider amateur radio community. This knowledge is unlikely to be present in a candidate who has not been a volunteer for a period and an RSGB member for a longer period.

Being a Board Director: The President is a Board Director so some knowledge of the work of a Director is helpful but not essential. Reference can be made to the Director's candidate pack on the website for more information.

Availability: The President is expected to attend Board meetings (which happen monthly in person or online), RSGB events such as the Convention and AGM, as well as major amateur radio events such as the National Hamfest. Presidents also commonly attend smaller amateur radio events such as radio club rallies and meetings. Candidates will need to be able to travel and stay away as needed.

Generally: The role of President is well suited to someone who can relate to and talk engagingly with a wide range of people of varying backgrounds.

Roles for election in 2025

President: Our current President John McCullagh, GI4BWM will reach the end of his second year as President at the AGM and so will stand down. We are seeking candidates for this important role.

Board Director: There will be two Elected Board Director vacancies. The first is to fill a vacancy which arose during 2024. The second is because Tony Miles, MMOTMZ will reach the end of his first three-year term at the AGM and must stand down or seek re-election.

Regional Representatives: Eight posts are available for nominations: Region 1 (Scotland South & Western Isles); Region 4 (England North-East); Region 7 (South Wales); Region 8 (Northern Ireland); Region 9 (London & Thames Valley); Region 10 (England South & South-East); Region 11 (SW England & Channel Islands); and Region 12 (England East & East Anglia).

Closing date for all the vacancies is 31 January 2025

The process: Full details of the roles and candidate forms are on the RSGB website at rsgb.org/election

Where there are more candidates than vacancies, a ballot will be held and we hope every RSGB member will vote.

RSGB HF Contests – what's new for 2025?

We have made some changes to our HF contests for 2025, outlined here. The details are available in our published rules; see the web link at the bottom of the article.

FT4 Series

The number of sessions in this popular series will be increased to 12 (one per month), with the best nine results contributing to each entrant's final score for the year. With five bands available and lots of activity, each event will be extended to two hours, from 8pm - 10pm. The first session is on Monday 20 January.

1.8 MHz Contests

The two 1.8MHz contests (February and November) will be shortened to three hours each, running from 8pm until 11pm. The option of making QSOs using SSB will be introduced to the February event as this coincides with a Dutch contest that includes SSB.

Commonwealth Contest

Following a wide-ranging review and consultation after the event in March 2024, the following changes are being made:

- The governance of the contest will be shared between a number of Commonwealth National Radio Societies, promoting the celebration of the Commonwealth that is at the heart of the event
- Participants will be encouraged to use "CC" rather than "BERU" when calling
- Scoring will be changed so that ten QSO points are awarded for QSOs with other continents and five QSO points for those with the same continent
- Entry sections will be High Power (maximum licensed power), Low Power (100W) and QRP (5W) sections, with no aerial restrictions.
- The UK & Crown Dependencies will be split into seven Commonwealth Call Areas to provide additional bonus points for stations outside the UK, in order to encourage inter-continental QSOs
- · Awards will be reallocated and expanded to encourage participation details will be published later

Self-spotting

Self-spotting will be permitted on a trial basis in 2025, for both assisted and unassisted entrants in all RSGB HF Contests and using all modes. Some advice will be made available on how self-spotting can be achieved.

Field Day registration

A facility for optional registration will be provided for Field Days and for the International Low Power Contest, so that entrants may have some advanced warning as to the teams likely to be taking part.

We've been developing the RSGB's Convention over recent years to suit the changing needs of the amateur radio community. From a face-toface meeting it evolved into an online event when we weren't allowed to meet, then changed again into a hybrid event, bringing together the best of both for people in this country and across the world. We've also been developing the programme to include practical workshops and forums to support radio amateurs who would like a safe and accessible environment in which to try or develop their practical skills.

The RSGB General Manager has been doing the role of Convention Chair for the last three years but has now stepped back from that additional voluntary role, so the RSGB is looking for a new Convention Chair.

This role needs someone who understands the advantages of both online and in-person events and who can contribute to shaping the RSGB Conventions of the future to suit the changing amateur radio audience.

We're looking for someone who is enthusiastic, proactive, collaborative and good at working with others in a strong team. They will also need an awareness of all aspects of amateur radio, including the latest developments and what might be on the horizon, so they can contribute ideas for speakers and practical activities that will attract a range of radio amateurs.

Experience of event organisation would be useful, but the organising team includes members with significant experience in this area.

The RSGB facilitates just over sixty lectures per year in a mixture of in-person, hybrid and remote formats. Fifty of these are at the RSGB Convention, and eleven are delivered through the livestreamed Tonight@8 webinars programme of events.



This set of presentations aims to cover a wide mix of amateur radio-related subjects, across all depths of

amateur radio experience and knowledge. They are watched and admired by RSGB members and non-members across the world.

The RSGB's recent Lecture Coordinator Keith Hotchkiss, GOFEA has stepped back from the role to focus on his professional commitments, so the RSGB is looking for someone new for this volunteer role.

The Lecture Coordinator will be part of the Tonight@8 and Convention teams. They will be proactive and collaborative, bringing ideas for presentations that educate and inspire radio amateurs to try something new, learn more about interesting topics and expand their knowledge of amateur radio.

They will lead the invitation and scheduling process for Tonight@8 webinars and will contribute to the decisions about Convention presentations. They will also be the main contact with Convention presenters, inviting them to speak, updating the speaker project plan and helping to create a balanced programme.

Reporting to the Convention Chair, the Lecture Coordinator would be a member of the RSGB Convention team but would not be required to take responsibility for organising and managing other aspects of the RSGB Convention.

Currently there are around 650k of incoming card for UK stations each year.

The QSL bureau concentrates on the B side – business side of a QSL – often ignoring the pictorial A side. Thousands of cards arrived from IQ4 prefix Italian club stations, shortly after the summer holidays, with cards featuring the April 150th anniversary of Marconi's birth.

There was something odd

about the A-side's black and white artistic and seemingly abstract pencil sketches. Weeks later at the final checking stage, two packs of A-side cards were laid down juxtaposed. Light bulb moment by simply moving them around, they joined up. The hunt was on to find more. Cards from nine clubs taking part in the ARI CRER event formed a full picture. We've never ever seen this before, something that may be unique and a real first. What a brilliant idea! It obviously took quite some thought and execution, but the outcome is amazing. We were bowled over and we hope you are. If you're lucky enough to have contacted all nine stations, cards to amaze your friends and family are on their way to your sub-manager. Make sure you have envelopes lodged.

For those that don't have all nine, some duplicates or one or two missing, why not play on the air, 'trading cards?

The UK appears to be number three on

u3a gets a new club call sign - G5UTA (University of the Third Age)

u3a has groups throughout the UK, which offer the opportunity for those who are retired or not working full time to explore new ideas, skills and interests. Amateur radio is one of u3a's subject areas and has a new adviser, Paul, GONDN. You can find out more or contact Paul via the u3a website at u3a.org.uk/learning/subjects/amateur-radio

Originally u3a had G5TAM as its callsign. In June, it was realised that the suffix UTA had only been allocated by Ofcom for special events and therefore was not a club callsign as such. Members of Wokingham u3a Amateur Radio Group (Wu3a AR Group) applied for a club callsign on behalf of u3a. This was possible because Wu3a AR Group is a u3a group, rather than an amateur radio club.

The group has close ties to Bracknell Amateur Radio Club (BARC) and members help each other at amateur radio events. The contribution from BARC towards the cost of the G5UTA licence was welcomed.

On 25 September, which was during national u3a Week, the group operated using G5UTA for the first time from their QTH at Woosehill Community Centre. Whilst not the official log, all first-day contacts were logged on the G5UTA QRZ.com web page.



G5UTA can be used by any u3a member with a Full licence, in support of a u3a event or demonstration. You don't have to be in a local u3a amateur radio group. Contact John, G8PJC via JohnPMcDonald@BTinternet.com to get authorisation for the time and place.

Celebrating one hundred years of organised amateur radio in South Africa



On 20 May 2025, the South African Radio League (SARL) celebrates its $100^{\mbox{\tiny th}}$ anniversary.

In conjunction with the 100th anniversary of the SARL, the SARL Centenary Marathon QSO Party is set to kick off for a year-long operating event starting from 00:00UTC on Wednesday 1 January 2025 and ending at 23:59UTC on Wednesday 31 December 2025.

Participating amateur radio operators worldwide (including Short Wave Listeners) can accumulate points and win awards by working South African amateur radio stations.

During 2025 the SARL, with the aid of its members and associated clubs, will be on the air with a special event callsign ZS100SARL, as well as the permanent callsigns ZS6SRL and ZS9HQ and other special event callsigns. It is not necessary to exchange anything other than a signal report. The SARL Centenary Marathon QSO Party is scored by totalling the values of all eligible contacts (QSOs).

As this is an honour-based event, to be eligible for any of these awards, applications must be made using the MS Excel format check sheet to record and track progress. This check sheet will serve as the final claim form and is available from the SARL website, to be submitted by email as an attachment to sarlcentenary@gmail.com by not later than 23:59UTC on Saturday 31 January 2026.

KW Days 2025

'KW Days' is now an annual event and will be with us once again in the New Year. Many young amateurs cut their radio teeth on the KW-160 AM Topbander in the late 1950s and early 60s. The KW-Atlanta, boasting 500W pep SSB input transceiver, was the last of the line in the late 1970s, following on the heels of the famous of all 'must-have' KW2000 series transceivers.

Kent-made equipment will be on the air across the UK and overseas on the Founders Weekend of 5-6 January 2025. The GB8KW multioperator station will again be very active from Cray Valley Radio Society's HQ in Eltham, showcasing a whole range of equipment and accessories for visitor inspection from 10am-4pm.

More GB-KW (0-9) calls will be active across the UK during January than ever before as the event's popularity grows and more equipment is once again rediscovered and restored. Such is the interest that many will be operating throughout January, calling CQ-KW on the hour/half hour when active.

The KW-Radios@groups.io is an active group of collectors and exemployees providing help and support to those undertaking restorations. An extensive archive of manuals, circuits and associated material continues to be curated. Vintage KW, AM & CW equipment will be found on VMARS or FISTS frequencies.

Classic SSB equipment, in tribute to the famous KW77 Rx, will be using non-WARC frequencies ending in 77KHz +/- QRM. Primarily 1.877/1977 MHz, 3.77 MHz, 7.177 MHz, 14.177 and14.277MHz. 21.277MHz and 28.377MHz +/- QRM.

and progressing to the more advanced. During tasks that incorporate a new skill, such as soldering, the organisers aim to buddy up novice constructors with the more experienced so that they can learn in a more inclusive and supported way. Could your club do something like this?

Ham Radio Science Citizen Investigation (HamSCI) recently secured funding to further the efforts of the organisation. The \$1.8 million grant was awarded to Lead HamSCI Organiser, Dr Nathaniel Frissell, W2NAF by the National Science Foundation.

HamSCI is network of amateur radio operators helping to measure weather effects among the earth's ionosphere. HamSCI member, and RSGB Propagation Studies Committee associate member, Prof Gwyn Griffiths, G3ZIL recently delivered a presentation on the programme at this year's RSGB Convention.

REGION 9: LONDON & THAMES VALLEY

Bracknell Amateur Radio Club (BARC) has recently moved to a new location with improved facilities, enabling the Club to expand and introduce activities that it has not been able to offer before.

The October meeting marked the debut of one such activity - its first 'Construction Club', where members could build a prepared electronic kit from scratch. Committee Member Roy MOWTP, planned and prepared the inaugural event, as well as sourcing the parts, cases and instructions. The first project was the assembly of a Pixie 40m CW Transceiver.

Participants included both newcomers to electronics, components, and soldering, as well as more experienced radio amateurs who have already constructed their own radios and associated accessories.

The Pixie was chosen as the first project because its component list, and relatively simple construction, made it a suitable task to complete within the Club's extended three-hour meeting time. Most members brought their own soldering irons, pliers, cutters, and, most importantly, glasses or magnifying lenses. Roy had also brought along plenty of spares, just in case.


With a team of experienced members assisting, the constructors quickly learned how to identify components, their correct orientation or polarity, and solder them in the right places on the circuit board. After an hour of building, the group took a short break for a Club update and refreshments before



everyone eagerly returned to their projects. While the construction club members were busy, other members enjoyed a demonstration of surface mount device soldering and de-soldering by Gareth M7GRB. Gareth also showcased his soldering microscope, which he uses for very fine work.

For members operating on Digital Mobile Radio (DMR), Colin MOXCA provided a DMR Helpdesk to assist with any radio or hotspot configuration issues. Returning to construction, three hours proved to be the exact amount of time needed to complete the project. The first Pixie transmitted CW on 7.023MHz at 9:40pm, followed quickly by two others.

Bunkers on the Air (UKBOTA): On 25 October, BARC members comprising Paul G4HLF, Colin MOXCA, Ray 2EORWJ, Chris MOGRW and Austin M7OOB participated in a successful activation of the Arborfield ROC Bunker (Ref: B/G-0017) as part of the UKBOTA programme. This was the first time the group has used the Club callsign, G4BRA, for a UKBOTA activation. The goal was to achieve at least 25 contacts while operating near the ROC bunker. They operated primarily on the 40m HF band (SSB) using a homebrew 88ft doublet antenna and an MFJ-969 manual tuner. The radio was a Xiegu X6100 transceiver running at 10W. Whilst they encountered a minor initial hurdle with microphone gain settings on the X6100, after adjustments, the station performed flawlessly, receiving many positive signal reports (59 reports). For logging, the group experimented with the Ham2K portable logger running on a Samsung tablet. This software offers a convenient solution and integrates with popular databases like SOTA, POTA, and BOTA. Ham2K can also interface with QRZ. com, allowing for real-time lookups as you enter a callsign into the log. Activation highlights:



- 8 DXCC Entities: England, Belgium, Netherlands, Northern Ireland, Scotland, Germany, France, and Wales
- 2 Bunker-to-Bunker QSOs
- 2 bands used: 40m SSB and 20m SSB

Despite less-than-ideal weather conditions, everyone thoroughly enjoyed the activation. The team maintained high enthusiasm throughout, and the experience proved valuable for all participants. They were able to manage high levels of activity by taking turns and allowing everyone a comfortable operating pace. Several pileups (multiple stations attempting to contact us simultaneously) occurred when switching bands, a first-time experience for some members. These situations provided valuable learning opportunities that will benefit future UKBOTA activations. The magic of RF communication, particularly operating HF QRP (low power) with a simple antenna, is undeniable! The group highly recommends attending future UKBOTA activities. It's a fantastic way to spend a few hours while expanding amateur radio skills.

REGION 10: SOUTH & SOUTH EAST

Crawley Amateur Radio Club (CARC) took part in Jamboree on the Air (JOTA) on 19 October, helping Scouts from 1st Langley Green, 5th Crawley and 7th Crawley to get on the airwaves. CARC provided a range of activities, starting with a brief explanation about 'How it all works', including how radio waves going in a straight line can reach the other side of the world. The explanation showed that HF radio is the answer, and that it bounces off layers in the atmosphere after being transmitted from a huge antenna.

The Scouts had the opportunity to take part in several activities including making Snail Morse keys, so they could learn and practise sending messages in Morse code. The Club also got the Scouts portable in the forest with a game of hide and seek, using radio location beacons and directional antennas.

The Scouts had a go using PMR446 handheld transceivers, or "walkie talkies" as they're known by everyone outside of radio world. Using the phonetic alphabet and correct RT procedure the Scouts passed short messages.

The main objective of the day was to contact other Scout troops using amateur radio. Although atmospheric conditions weren't brilliant, and the airwaves a little bit crowded due to a couple of competitions being held, the event was a success. As well as talking to Scouts in nearby Merstham, contact was made with two stations in the Netherlands and one on Scotland, plus places in between.

A huge thanks to CARC for all their hard work. The event, as well as being great fun, helped the Scouts work towards the World Challenge Badge and the Communicator Activity Badge
